A quote from the author Alice Walker: "Anybody can observe the Sabbath, but making it holy surely takes the rest of the week."

Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg, writing about Leviticus 19:18, which she calls the heart of Torah (the teachings of God): "The most important act of spiritual service that you can do is to love other people with all the compassion and engagement that you would wish someone else to offer you, that you would offer to yourself."

The Rev. Tish Harrison Warren, an Anglican priest, in her wonderful book Prayer in the Night, writes: "Our task is to take up practices where we name, with utter honesty, the brokenness of the world and the promise of what's to come."

In her new book of blessings, Have a Beautiful, Terrible Day, Kate Bowler writes: "It's the strangest phenomenon and one all understand because we have seen it up close. The more we love...then the more we love. There is no scarcity in love. There is a scarcity of time and resources, yes, but love grows and grows."

As a few of you know, I'm a fan of Kate Bowler's writings in general. The epigraph of her new book is one of my favorite quotes: "Here is the world. Beautiful and terrible things will happen. Don't be afraid." (Frederick Buechner)

Our Saviour's Easter Cross

The beautiful floral Easter Cross is a long-standing tradition at Our Saviour's. The striped trunk of a Christmas tree is used for a Cross during Lent, as a Lenten reminder, then transformed into the Easter Cross on Easter morning to celebrate Resurrection Day.

This does not just "happen" but takes many hands and lots of work. We have had a faithful small group working on this each year. Our trusty group is getting smaller. This year especially, we need more help. If you have any flowers, blooming trees, we need them. If you have time to help place the flowers on the cross, we need you. **Flowers** can be dropped off Friday, March 29th, or Saturday March 30th by 10 am. If no one is at the church please leave them on the front porch, in front of the office door. **Assembling the Cross** will begin Saturday, March 30th at 10 am. It usually takes an hour or two depending on how many volunteers show up. No real "skill" is needed, just a willingness to help and have a good time.
