From the Pastor

Music plays a central role in Lutheran worship. I have memories of holding the "old red book" and singing hymns that were accompanied by a talented organist. As a teenager, I learned that our congregation's organist continued to take lessons monthly. I remember it surprising me that someone who gave piano lessons would still be taking lessons herself, but she explained that the organ and piano are very different instruments to play, and said she would always have something to learn.

Ours is not the pipe organ you may be familiar with. Instead, our organ was state of the art for the 1950s, complete with vacuum tubes! Repair techs have warned us over the past decade or so that they would soon be unable to continue to service the organ, leading the worship team, property team, and church council to difficult conversations about the organ's future with us.

We've had these conversations over the past few years, trying to determine how to most faithfully and responsibly steward the congregation's resources, as well as try to thoughtfully plan for the future.

Further complicating the conversation is the fact that fewer people are taking piano lessons today. Even fewer learning to play sufficiently well enough to play in public. Far fewer are learning to play the organ. We were fortunate that, when Arlene decided to retire, Beth was willing to step in immediately. We had anticipated needing a months-long search to find someone.

As much as I wish otherwise, as much as some of you may wish otherwise, we have come to the conclusion that it is most likely time to say farewell to the organ. Attempting to continue to repair it would be costly and, in the long term, not feasible. Taking on that expense, given the long list of repairs and updates needed for our aging building and the uncertainty of having someone who would be able to play it, does not feel like faithful or responsible stewardship of the congregation's resources. By moving the organ out of the space it currently occupies, we would gain a flexibility to the space that can allow for more comfortable seating arrangements for our musicians. Additionally, we may be able to relocate our livestream operation from the hallway to a spot in that area, allowing those who monitor our livestream to be amongst us during worship.

Please know that this has not been an easy decision to make, nor is it easy for me to communicate it to you. If you have any questions, I'll do my best to answer them. If you would simply like to express your disappointment, I'm here to listen.

We will keep you informed about this process and, before the organ is removed, we will offer it an appropriate farewell during worship.



National Healthcare Decision Day is April 16. Individual healthcare decisions made in Oregon are specified utilizing the Advanced Directive and POLST.

The Advanced Directive is a legal document, also referred to as a Living Will. This form is used to choose a person who has your permission to make healthcare decisions for you if you become too sick to speak for yourself. This person becomes your Healthcare representative, your Medical Power of Attorney. The document instructs health care providers who will speak for you and the medical decisions they should make.

The POLST, "Portable Orders for Life Sustaining Treatments," is a medical document that a person may use to turn your end-of-life treatment wishes into medical orders. It is utilized for a person with a serious progressive illness, and for a person who is older, frail, and not wanting all available medical treatments. A POLST is never required by any healthcare providers.

These documents are usually provided by healthcare providers. Please let me know if you have questions or would like to receive either document.

April is National Foot Health Awareness Month. Foot checkups are recommended annually. If you have not had a thorough check, recently see me.

April is Testicular Cancer Awareness Month. Monthly self-examination is recommended and is very important as proactive care. Please make this part of your self-care, just as women should be proactively doing breast self-examinations.
